Pioneer Park Playground Update



Most of you have heard by now that the Pioneer Park playground structure burned down in the early hours of October 6. Many of our members were part of that awesome community project back in 2000–2001, with AAUW initiating and taking the lead (thanks to co-presidents Michelle Sitz and Janet Pardo-Garber). What an achievement to see hundreds of volunteers coming together to create a community playground loved by so many for years to come.

The City has been working with fire investigators and insurance adjusters; while the official investigation is still pending, it is now believed that an accelerant was used. Samples were collected and sent off for analysis, so now the City can move forward and clear out the debris. It was not a total loss. The swings and the lower play area were deemed safe and will be reopened for use very soon.

On October 18, AAUW members met with City representatives to discuss our roles in the rebuilding effort. AAUW has agreed to once again take the lead in forming a steering committee made up of local citizens, which will guide and focus the community rebuild process. The first meeting will be in mid-November. Both AAUW and the City want to rebuild the same type of structure (we have the original design), allowing for modifications to address vandalism and maintenance concerns. Expansion is a possibility for the upper picnic areas.

A community meeting will be scheduled after the architect has been chosen, most likely after the first of the year. However, local citizens have already started their own efforts raising funds for the rebuild project. Donations have already been accepted by the City of Pendleton and can be taken at City Hall, the library, and the City Parks office.


The targeted date for construction is June 2013. The contractor's day would be the last day of school (June 19). The community build would take place over the next three days, Thursday – Saturday, June 20–22, with the grand "reopening" on Sunday. There will be lots of chances in the coming months for AAUW members to help with the project, from fundraising to construction. SAVE the DATES!

Thursday, October 4, 2012 Vert Clubroom

We gathered at the Vert with hosts Susan Badger Doyle and Janet Groat. There were 30 members and 3 guests, and all enjoyed the program presented by city officials: Jane Hill, City Council; Steve Chrisman, Economic Development; and Robb Corbett, City Manager. There will be an emphasis on cleaning up neighborhoods, building middle-income housing, and making use of the airport property.

Co-President Karen King called the meeting to order at 8:15 p.m. She asked two of our members, one a long-time member, Juliette Sawyer, and a new member, Renee Struthers, to each introduce herself.

Reports:

- 1. Gail Plute, Finance We have \$1,219.39 in the checking account and \$6,297.38 in savings. The budget as approved by the Board was passed out. Kate Mace moved that we accept the budget, Marlene Kraut seconded the motion, and the budget was approved.
- 2. Kathy Ward, Grapefruit Chair There is a sign-up sheet for the Altrusa Bazaar, and Kathy started that around. She reported that all the packets are ready, and we should start calling our list on or about October 15. They have gone up \$.50 a box to \$17.50. A half box is still \$9.00. We will deliver the grapefruit off the PGG dock on Saturday, December 8.
- 3. Meredithe Felton, Voter Registration She reported that she and Renee still need people to take some slots at the Library and Great Pacific on Tuesday and Friday. She asked that volunteers speak to her after the meeting.
- 4. Susan Badger Doyle, Membership She has the directories ready and each member should pick her's up before she leaves the meeting. The number on the front is your AAUW number and is used when you log into the AAUW web site.

The Lunch Bunch will meet on October 18 at 11:15 a.m. at Heritage Station to carpool to Pilot Rock for lunch at Archies.

- 5. Michele Sitz, OES Our branch of AAUW has designated \$1,000 to the Oregon East Symphony for the Playing for Keeps program. We are asking that our members match that gift this year as they did last year. All the funds were pledged by November 8 last year. The checks should be made out to OES Music Academy with AAUW somewhere on the check so we get credit.
- 6. Karen King Shirts. All that were ordered have been delivered.

Umatilla County Historical Society Presents



The Umatilla County Historical Society is presenting a program on women's suffrage on Saturday, November 10, 11:00 a.m. – 2:30 p.m., at the Vert Clubroom and Little Theater. Harriet Isom will begin the event with a talk on Abigail Scott Duniway, leading Oregon suffragist. After a catered lunch, storyteller Debbie Dimitri will perform as Alice Paul, a leading American suffragist and activist who suffered brutal treatment in prison for the cause. This promises to be a memorable event.

The event is a celebration of 100 years of women's suffrage in Oregon. It is also the launch of the exhibit *Votes for Women! The Oregon Story*, which will be at the Heritage Station Museum through December. The exhibit has been installed at several locations around the state, and if you missed it elsewhere, this is your chance to view this outstanding portrayal of the suffrage movement in Oregon.
