We are also looking for some members to get involved and take on some active roles in the Branch. Here's what we need in elected positions, 2-year terms:

We also have some appointed positions that need to be filled. Can you help with one of these?

- Webmaster with help from an AAUW resource at National in Washington, DC, we were able to put together a Branch webpage. It's been a great start, and we thank Mary Kinsch for her work getting it going. However, Mary would like to step down now, and we need someone who is willing to take on this project. This could be a very important position for our Branch. It's a great resource that we can share with prospective members. How would you like to learn about websites?
- Chamber of Commerce Liaison We all agreed to continue our Chamber membership, but we need to get better about taking advantage of what they can offer us. Can you participate in Chamber luncheons, Kick Up at 5 events, and whatever else comes up? Talk up the Pendleton AAUW branch in these community meetings? Then this is for you.
- Branch historian and/or librarian June Whitten and Sue Waldman created a Branch timeline a few years back. It's an interesting look back at snapshots of what this Branch has done. But we need to pick up from where they left off and keep it going. There are also some papers and files that need to get better organized for safe keeping and to help with our record keeping. Is anyone willing to take this on? This could be the same person or two different people.

Don't forget to attend the February 1st general meeting with guest speaker Jodie Harnden, an earth science teacher at Sunridge Middle School, talking about her experiences at NASA and predicting air quality in Pendleton. Also coming up is the EO Forum on February 11 with speakers discussing "Coal

Exports." Feel free to join the Lunch Bunch on February 20 at 11:45 at Cadillac Jack's. The next Board meeting will be at Marty King's on February 20; all members are welcome at Board meetings.

We look forward to seeing you at any and all of these activities in February!!

Pioneer Park playground project update (Yep, we're not done yet!):

- The City finally received the last payment from the insurance carrier, which added a considerable amount to the remaining project balance.
- We are working with the two community members (also both AAUW members) who donated
 to the reward fund. The money will be repurposed back to the project for security issues,
 possibly as a second camera to provide 100% coverage of the playground.
- We will remove the cinder block walls along the west-side pathway and install benches facing into the playground and into the grass park. We received a \$1,000 grant (the project was submitted by an anonymous, local supporter Thank You!) and this will be used as requested for landscaping purposes, most likely in this new seating area.
- Other projects: a new ADA drinking fountain; install 'horse mats' under some swings and equipment; extending the asphalt pathway around the entire play area for better access; and a designated handicapped parking space in the parking area south of the playground with better signage. If money is still available, the addition of a handicapped ramp onto the bandstand will be considered.

The committee met with Darrin Umbarger, a local contact regarding ADA issues. Discussion was about the viability and necessity for the additional poured-in-place rubber pathway that we've discussed

before. Darrin felt that the current surface was adequate (with those changes listed above), and the City indicated that regardless, they do not have the staffing to maintain the mixed surface (wood chips and pathway) inside the fenced area. The cost for covering the entire play surface would be excessive for the project, so the plan is to move forward with these new additions shown above instead. OES Music Academy

Three years ago, amid massive Pendleton School District budget cuts, elementary stings education became one of the casualties. As a concerned parent and AAUW member, I made a plea to AAUW Pendleton Branch to make a three-year commitment to support continued string education through Oregon East Symphony Music Academy. AAUW enthusiastically stepped up and has contributed over \$2,000 each year for the strings education program. This month will mark the final year of the commitment that will conclude with a member match goal of \$1,000, and I am confident we will again exceed that goal thanks to the generosity of AAUW Pendleton Branch members.

Where would music education in Pendleton be without the support you and other community members have provided? Orchestra would be completely absent from our schools, and symphony concerts by OES would be greatly diminished. String music education that begins in elementary school provides musicians for middle school orchestra, which provides musicians for high school orchestra, who then have an opportunity to be players in OES Orchestra or our preparatory orchestras.

What has happened with community support of string education? The OES Music Academy is thriving! The Pendleton School District has been awarded the prestigious NAMM award for "Best Communities for Music Education," twice! Music education in our small, rural community is strong and is happening every day.

These are a few highlights:

- PHS orchestra and choir students from performed Mozart Requiem with Eastern Oregon University in two sold out performances.
- Currently, 75 elementary students are learning strings in Symphony Strings after school program.
- Raising the Bar, a new OES music mentorship program, matches student players with experienced adult orchestra members to facilitate the students' ability to play with OES. Twelve students are participating in our pilot season.
- Raising the Bar students, their high school orchestra peers, and the PHS choirs partnered with OES Orchestra and Chorale this season to present the Holiday Music Festival to nearly 500 audience members.
- Band, orchestra, and choir combined works are performed every year during the PHS concert season.

"Be the Music" is the theme for OES this season, because in Pendleton every community member can be the music – through learning, teaching, performing, or supporting. You are the music AAUW Pendleton Branch – thank you!
