A Note About AAUW Program Hosts

At the membership meeting in September, members will have the opportunity to sign up to be a host at meetings for the year. If hosts are still needed after the meeting, you may be called and asked if you can do it. It's only a one time a year responsibility, and the branch needs and appreciates your help.

Two hosts are needed for meetings at the Vert (October, November, April, and May). They are responsible for bringing dessert and drinks; cups, plates, napkins, and any utensils needed (paper and plastic); and serving items. Many meetings have just juice and water, but some have brought a carafe and hot pot for hot drinks. They need to be at the Vert at 6:30.

For the Saturday meetings at Prodigal Son (January, February, and March), one or two hosts are needed. They only need to bring chocolates or candy to scatter on the tables and then should greet people as they arrive.

Additional hosts are not needed for the potluck meetings (September and June), which are usually held at a member's home.

We gathered at the Vert with Miriam Munck, Kate Ely, and Beth Read as hosts.

Co-President Karen Wagner welcomed everyone and turned the meeting over to our co-Program VP Kate Ely for the introduction of our speaker, Dr. Robert Bartlett, who gave an interesting and informative program titled "Triple Nickles: Jumping into Fire." We had a large and appreciative audience.

At 8:30 Co-President Karen Wagner called the business meeting to order.

- 1. Minutes were accepted as printed in the newsletter.
- 2. Finance report presented by Karen King, Finance VP. The balances are: checking, \$1,456.30 and savings, \$7,573.24. She talked about the new membership dues program. Dues can be paid online or by check to Karen. She would like anyone paying online to contact her first, but she has forms available, too.
- 3. STEM Miriam Munck reported on the AAUW STEM programs at the Sunridge Middle School. thirty plus girls went to Eastern Oregon University in La Grande in October for Girls in Science Day. We sponsored and funded a bus for them to attend. Also, this year we sponsored the after-school STEM club for girls. Ten to fifteen girls met seven or eight times. Miriam hopes to have the program next year She reported that social science research shows that middle school is the ideal time to instill interest in STEM.
- 4. State Convention Highlights Four went to convention: Jill Heffner, Karen King, Kate Mace, and Marlene Krout. Karen said she learned quality is not the same as equity in a workshop. She said they were asked to use the term firearm safety, not gun control. Kate Mace said the woman who won our basked was excited and that she was hoping to win it for Kathy Burke's bracelet.
- 5. Membership Survey Karen Wagner reported that the survey is still being analyzed.
- 7. Election of Officers Kathy Ward made a motion and Kate Mace seconded to accept the slate of officers. The motion was approved. The Officers to be installed at the June General Meeting are:
