Program December 2: "Outlook for BMCC"

Speaker: Mark Browning, President of Blue Mountain Community College (BMCC)

Mark Browning took over the helm of BMCC on September 7, after his selection over three other finalists. He and his wife Kym have come to Pendleton from Nampa, Idaho. He has three adult sons scattered over Idaho and Utah, three "criminally cute" grandkids, and two dogs named Lewis and Clark. And, amazingly in this time of housing scarcity, they have already closed on a house in Pendleton.

He is a self-described "farm boy from Western Montana," growing up in Stevensville on a small family farm in the Bitterroot Valley. But it was in neighboring Idaho where his family moved when he was in high school and where he has had his first career track in radio and television and a second career track in community college administration. The *East Oregonian* has profiled his unusual and impressive background in several articles that provided the information below.



His earliest career start was in Idaho radio and then television when he eventually became an anchor and news director for local Boise TV stations. He realized that if he wanted to advance his career outside the bounds of broadcast journalism, he would need a degree. Hence at age 39, he enrolled at Idaho State University, ultimately obtaining a bachelor's degree in mass communications.

He then went from covering Idaho government to joining it. He became the chief communications and legislative officer for the Idaho State Board of Education. From there he was appointed as a vice president of communications at North Idaho College in Coeur d'Alene. In 2016, he took on a new role as an administrator at the College of Western Idaho, a community college established in Nampa to serve Boise's rapidly growing suburbs and currently serving 32,000 students. He comes to Pendleton from this position.

Admirably, he has continued to advance his education, obtaining a master's degree in public administration from the University of Idaho and enrolling in an education doctorate program at Idaho State. He will soon defend his dissertation on dual credits and the relationship between community colleges and the K-12 system.

A key aspect of his administrative talents goes back to his years in broadcasting when he honed his skills at storytelling. He considers it the ultimate extension of his job at BMCC to be its lead storyteller. One of his first goals, in fact, is to restore the college's communications and marketing department that under the previous president was outsourced to the InterMountain Education Service District.

A November 20 article in the *East Oregonian* outlines several of the problems facing the new president, such as a student headcount drop by around 30% in 2020 and an enrollment increase this fall of only 38 students. Too few students are in full time enrollment, which affects the level of state funding. In addition, dozens of faculty positions have been eliminated in the budget cuts of the past two years.

Celebrating 140 Years of AAUW

We have now had the opportunity to see AAUW Funds in action! AAUW marked its 140th Anniversary with a special online award ceremony and celebration on November 17. At the 140th Anniversary webinar we were introduced to one of AAUW's fellowship recipients, Dr.

Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala, the 2021 recipient of the AAUW Alumnae Recognition Award. This award honors a past recipient of an AAUW fellowship or grant who has attained outstanding success and distinction in their chosen profession.

Dr. Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala is Director-General of the World Trade Organization and one of *Time* magazine's 100 most influential people of 2021. Her webinar presentation was interesting and inspiring.



Dr. Okonjo-Iweala said she was very appreciative of the AAUW fellowship she received while working toward her doctorate from MIT. SHE SAID This fellowship took away the worry about food and rent and allowed her to concentrate on her studies—and she saved enough to pay for her wedding dress. She went on to serve her country of Nigeria as Minister of Foreign Affairs, Coordinating Minister for the Economy, and then Minister of Finance. Now, holding both Nigerian and United States citizenships, she is the first woman to be Director-General of the World Trade Organization.

She is a strong advocate of following your passion. Passion, she said, is what makes a leader. AAUW can be proud of having been instrumental in the life of Dr. Okonjo-Iweala. This is an affirmation of the importance of contributions from Pendleton Branch and its individual members to AAUW Funds. AAUW Funds makes a difference in the world!
