Walla Walla advocates raised awareness for missing and murdered Indigenous women at two evening vigils and an exhibit of red dresses on display in downtown Walla Walla in early May. The red hands printed over the mouths of MMIW advocates symbolize the silence Indigenous women have endured, while the empty dresses are a visual reminder of the high rates of violence, pain, and suffering that Indigenous women face. Organizer Lucinda Richards said, "A lot of the Indigenous women are silenced and we're not going to be silenced anymore."

Red Dress Day originated in Canada, where Indigenous artist Jaime Black debuted her REDress art installation in 2010. It's now observed annually throughout North America on Sunday, May 5, coinciding with the National Day of Awareness for missing or murdered Indigenous people. Richards, a social worker with Trilogy Recovery Community, brought the effort to Walla Walla three years ago.

Indigenous communities, and especially Indigenous women, face disproportionately high rates of violence nationally and in Washington. This year, she's partnering with Jeanine Gordon, special assistant to the president for Native American outreach at Whitman College, to reach more community members. Gordon said the effort is meant to bring attention to the lack of justice, the lack of documentation, and the lack of follow through on prosecution of abuse and assault that leads to missing and murdered tribal people.

"More attention brings changes like those that have been seen in Washington, such as the recent appointment of Assistant U.S. Attorney Bree Black Horse to a position dedicated to prosecuting MMIP cases," Gordon said. "Having events like this brings that cultural education into the campus setting, which is highly important for our students as we develop systematic support for our tribal students here, but also just to raise everybody's awareness and education around tribal issues," she said.
